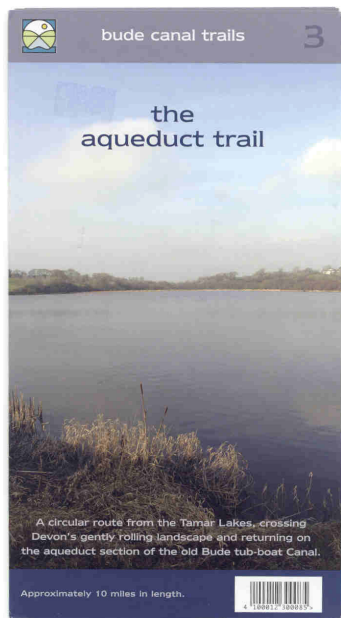


The Aqueduct Trail

Distance: Approx. 10 miles

Time: Allow 5 hours

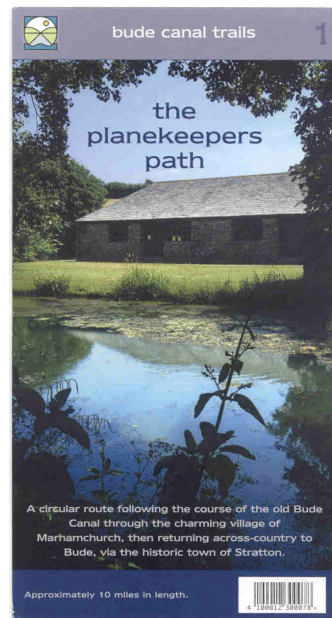
Terrain: Mixture of Canal Footpath, country lanes and footpaths.

Info: This long (10 miles) but easy trail meanders through pretty borderland of Cornwall and Devon. Its first half takes you from Tamar Lakes reservoirs, along country lanes which criss-cross the winding course of the Bude tub-boat canal. The return journey follows the tow-path alongside the 'feeder arm' of the canal (also known as the Bude Aqueduct), which runs north from Brendon Bridge for 4 ½ miles, back to the Tamar Lakes.

The Planekeepers Path

Distance: Approx. 10 miles

Time: Allow 5 – 6 hours

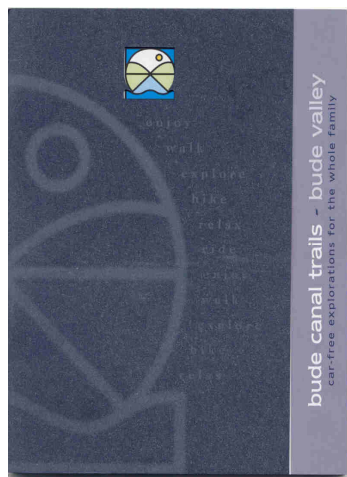
Terrain: Country lanes and footpaths. Quite an easy, but long walk.

Info: This walk commences from the sea-lock, where vessels would leave the open water and enter the Lower Canal Basin to discharge their cargoes into Barges. At Helebridge the Barges were unloaded and transport continued inland by smaller, shallow tub-boats. The Planekeepers Path follows the route the boatmen took as they tendered their cargoes from Bude to the Thurlibeer Inclined Plane. It then continues through beautiful countryside on footpaths and quiet lanes and head back to via the ancient town of Stratton.
